Boehm's United Church of Christ to Receive Historic Marker

The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission has chosen Boehm's Church as the site for a historical marker commemorating the life and work of John Philip Boehm.

The dedication ceremony will be held on Saturday, June 23rd at 10:30 a.m. at the Boehm's United Church of Christ,

571 Penllyn-Blue Bell Pike. In addition there will by an open house - an opportunity for people to explore the church building and the cemetery. The open house will be from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on the 23rd.

Rev. Boehm is being honored for founding the Reformed Church of Pennsylvania and introducing a unique form of constitutional church government in colocial America.



The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission administers the historical marker program to recognize the memory of people, places, events, and innovations that have affected the lives of Pennsylvanians over the centuries since William Penn founded the Commonwealth. More than 2,000 aluminum markers tell the important and interesting stories that are part of the history of Pennsylvania.

Warrington Historical Society Members Visit Franklinville School

Several members of the Warrington Historical Society recently visited with Marie Goldkamp at our Franklinville School. They were interested in hearing and seeing Franklinville's story.

They are in the process of reclaiming the County Line Road school house that is located at 10 Folly Road, at the intersection of Folly and County Line Road in Warrington. The original one room school was built in 1858. It was known as the Red Roof College in the early 1900s by locals because of its red tin roof.

After many years as a two-story residence, the building has been returned to its one-room format - thanks to many volunteer hours - including 6 Eagle Scout projects. They have also received Quester grants.

An Open House is scheduled for Saturday, June 2 from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. (Rain date Sunday, June 3 from noon to 4 p.m.)

Flags Fly for Memorial Day

Each Memorial Day Bob Whittock would bring by flags to be put out in front of the 1895 Schoolhouse. This year we put out some from our collection. Thanks, Bob.

We recently discussed the flag that would have flown at the school in 1895. It would have had 44 stars - one for each state in the Union at that time. By 1896 another star was added as Utah joined the USA. We do have a 45 star flag in our collection.

Prior to 1912, as person was permitted to



arrange the stars on the official U.S. flag in any shape they desired - as long as they kept them on a blue field and used the correct number.



Motels of the Area

Buck Amey recently donated a photo of a post card of the Swiss Cottage Motel which was located on DeKalb (202) to the southwest of Skippack Pike. Dr. Clarke's dental office is now on the site.

The photo brought to mind several other motels of the area - including Deck's and The Yellow House. It would be great to have a full list of motels and rooming houses in the area. One of my favorites is the rooming house for

workers on the Lindenwold Estate - which is now a private home on Farm Lane in Ambler. It is currently for sale. Another was the hotel on Butler Pike in Ambler which was a rooming house into the 1990s. It is now a restaurant.
