- * Atlas of Montgomery County, Volumes A and B, 1935 from Herb Levy.




Little Leather Library Corporation by Peg Johnston

On a recent SEPTA ride from Philadelphia, I observed a young man engrossed in a small (2 1/2 by 4 inches) leather book. Using the privilege of age, I asked him what he

was reading. He eagerly shared that he had bought the book (an edition of Thoreau) at a flea market. He had researched the books and found they were printed beginning in 1913. In the first year sixty titles - all in the public domain - were published and one million were sold in a little over a year.

On line, I found that the books were published in New York between 1916 and 1923. Over 25 million of the little books were sold or given as premiums. Whitman's ordered a total of 15,000 copies of fifteen Shakespeare



The 3 by 5 inch books were first bound in leather, but during W.W.I the leather was replaced with with a synthetic bindings which turned out to smell bad in hot weather. During the war, a gift of ten books could be sent to soldiers and sailors overseas. Check Wikipedia for more information.

As you know, we have a very extensive collection of photographs, objects of historical interest, books and papers, but we have not known exactly what was in the collection. Now we will know, and the general public will also be able to benefit.

To see the data base, go to our website at www.wvalleyhs.org and click on the Museum Collection button on the left. You can then select the type of item you want or select the entire collection. To search, use the CTRL7 feature and enter your search word. We are still in the process of entering items, but many of them are already in. Many, many thanks to the team that developed and are implementing this large project, especially board members Peg Johnston, Emmy Simon and John Simon, and our good friend Krista Lewis.

As was announced at the February meeting and discussed in the March newsletter, your board has recommended that the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society agree to have the Historical Society of Whitpain merge into us. The HSoW's board had also recommended this merger to their members and the members voted in favor at their meeting last week. We will be asking our members to approve the merger at the April meeting.

As you know, we have been working closely with the HSoW for the past several years, and have seen the advantages of combining. There has already been a meaningful overlap in membership and our service area (Ambler, Lower Gwynedd and Whitpain) includes all of their service area. Our focus on local history has been very

similar, particularly looking at the changes since the days when the area was still rural, and we both have had a special emphasis on educational history. The HSoW owns the Franklinville School, which is a one room school of the sort that our 1895 School was designed to replace. They also have a collection of materials that will complement our collection.
