The latest project at the 1895 Schoolhouse involves replacing the basement and fire escape doors with solid wooden doors that close completely and can be locked. For the last few years closing and locking the fire escape doors has been a challenge, but the new doors also help the building meet fire codes. The new front entry stairs now have attractive railings that make the front entry safer and welcoming. Thanks to Whitpain Township workers for the new entry and for the patching of the driveway.

Lower Gwynedd commissioners voted at their July 26th meeting to host a display case from the WVHS. Township workers will pick up the showcase next week and the first collection will be in place by mid-month. The exhibit will be changed every three months and feature items from the WVHS collections on Lower Gwynedd. The first exhibit include items about Sally Wister, a visitor to Penllyn during the Revoluntionary War, and early businesses in the SpringHouse area.

Future exhibits will focus on local education and local industry (AmChem and Marsden Glass). WVHS member Herb Levy will be advising us on local history. Many items in our collection were donated by Joe Schneider.

The display case in Ambler Borough building has been up since early July and has received good comments.

Keeping The Record

The following is from the newsletter of the DeForest Area Historical Society - my hometown in Wisconsin.

We Can't Save Every Old House

But we can preserve records and memories houses that were part of our history. A house built by Robert Heisig, who was in the tin business, occupied the northeast corner of Holum and Main where the new Norske Nook now stands.

Heisig's house replaced the earlier construction erected there by George Durkee after be bought the lot in 1872. Durkee, who served as postmaster, used the site for a residence, general store, and post office. In 1895 he built a dam on the Yahara River behind his house. The created a pond that was used for cutting ice, swimming, and ice skating.

Locally we have lost a number of building this past year. Each has a story. We should be taking photos and recording stories - including names. For example: the house on



Morris Road just south of the Cathcart, the house known locally as the West house, is being razed. The house itself was was rebuilt in the early 1900s after the orginal house (dating back to Revolutionary era) burned. Family owners over the years include: Syfert, Styer, Rile, Heist, and Thayer - before Edward and Gloria West bought the farm in the 1960s. In the early 2000s, new owners wanted to build a horse farm. When zoning issues arose, it was decided to sub-divide the farm. The above information comes from Whitpain...Crossroads in Time and from Bob Whittock.

In Ambler, the stately building at the corner of Main and Butler is being painted and cleaned and looking ready for a new use. Looks like reunse will save this building.

There are several historic homes on Penllyn Pike that are for sale. One of special interest is the Orthodox House - the subject of a newsletter article in the past. Hopefully they all find appreciative buyers.



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
