Odd-Fellows Hall - not Grange Hall


In the November newsletter a recent donation was described. It was a plaque honoring the Center Square Grange. The article referred to the Grange Hall that was located north west of Center Square. Bob Whittock pointed out that this building was actually the home to the Center Square Odd-Fellows.

According to Bob's records, the Center Square Grange held its first meetings in February 1919 at the Centre Square fire Hall and subsequently held most of their meetings there. They also held picnics at various local parks. Bob's information comes from diaries of Mrs. Bertha "Beideman" Rezer, 1898 graduate of the Whitpain 1895 High School. Bob has been using the diaries to compile records of local organizations and activities. Thanks, Bob.



Schools of Lower Gwynedd Township

As Wissahickon School District celebrates 50 years, this newsletter will feature the history of education in first Lower Gwynedd Township followed by Ambler Borough, and Whitpain Township and how the three joined together to form the Wissahickon

School District in 1966. This month we feature Lower Gwynedd's schools.



From very early days, students from the Gwynedd area attended the Friends' school on 202. The building is still used by the Friends' meeting and

shares a parking lot with the meetinghouse. A plaque indicates the historic building.

Nearby three replacement public schools were built: the Penllyn school in Penllyn, the Maple Grove school at Plymouth and Schoolhouse Rd., and the Cedar Hill school on the corner of Cedar Hill Road and Bethlehem Pike.

The first Penllyn school was located at Wister Avenue and Old Penllyn Pike. in 1923 and served the surrounding community of students. Later a larger building was constructed on Gwynedd Avenue just for the Penllyn community. This building no longer exists. Penllyn Park is how located on the site.

The stone Maple Grove School was located at the corner of Plymouth and Schoolhouse Road. The building is now a private home. (See right.)

The Cedar Hill School was located at the corner of Cedar Hill Road and Bethlehem

Pike. By 1936 the building had been repurposed as a private home. The classrooms were replaced by a living room and the hall. The house was recently rehabilitated and is currently for sale.

A more modern SpringHouse School was built on Norristown Road near the intersection with Bethlehem Pike in the early 1900s. It served public school students into the 1960s. The building is now used by the elementary grades of Gwynedd Mercy Academy.

Students from the Lower Gwynedd area who wished to further their education would travel to Ambler High School, Norristown High School, North Penn High School, or private high schools.

Gwynedd Mercy High School and Gwynedd Mercy University are also located in Lower Gwynedd.



Brown's Folly Questers Visit 1895 Schoolhouse

The Brown's Folly Questers recently held their monthly meeting at the 1895 Schoolhouse. Russ Bellavance shared the history of the building and society, and members toured the museum. They enjoyed their visit. One member and her husband worked for Moore Products and they will be sharing with us some of the history of this local company.

Whitpain Deed Shared with Whitpain Township
