Report from the Trip to Worcester Historical Society and the Skippack Historical Society

The WVHS/HSW May 21st outing was well attended and very interesting. The group started at the Farmers' Union Hall (maintained by the Worcester Historical Society) where we had a tour of the farm museum on the main floor of the refurbished barn. The array of farm and home implements brought back memories for many members. We were impressed with the displays and came away with ideas for our museum.

Our second stop was the Indenhofen Farm House which is maintained by the Skippack Historical Society. Charlie Miller gave us a tour - complete with stories - of the house.

Both sites are well worth a visit. Check their websites for dates and times. There is a re-enactment each fall at the Indenhofen Farm. Mr. Miller noted that both sites are near to Wentz Farm, one of our excellent county parks.

Recent Donations

LLoyd Conard, of North Carolina, recently donated two tools which complement our Conard Auger/tool collection.

The wooden based plane, at right,came from Monmouth County, N.J. It has no manufacturing names on it, other than on the

cutting blade, to verify what company actually made it. The Conard Auger Company made metal parts (including the frog) for several plane making companies in the Delaware Valley.

Planes came in various sizes - depending on the lumber to be smoothed. The blade could

be shaped to create moldings.





The barn auger bit, at left, would fit into a handle and used to "drill" holes in wooden posts and beams. Then 2.5" dowels would be used to make locking joints.

The metal parts of both of these tools were likely made at the Conard Auger Company of Fort Washington. The company was owned by the Conard family in the late 1800s and early 1900s and was located across Bethlehem Pike from Clifton House along the Sandy Run Creek.

The Conard family were long time residents of Whitpain. Two WVHS founders, Dot and Henry Conard, lived in The Cloot which is at the intersection of Penllyn-Blue Bell and Stenton.

Residents for Open Space at Lindenwold Estates by Member James Magaziner

A new organization has formed that is promoting their vision of what they think the Lindenwold property could be. They call themselves "Residents for Open Space at Lindenwold Estates (ROSLE)" Presently a property development team comprised of Endeavor Properties, Guidi Homes, and the Goldenberg Group has proposed a 378 unit, densely built mixed-use complex for the 45 acre site that for years has been known as St. Mary's Home for Children.

ROSLE's vision is that the St. Mary's property would remain open space for the Upper Dublin and Ambler community. I spoke with Tracy Semen who, while raising her two young children, is one of the many concerned local residents trying to promote ROSLE. ROSLE believes that the property can be kept open for general recreational use including fishing, canoeing, winter cross country skiing, hiking, etc.

ROSLE's belief is that by keeping the 45 acre site open, Upper Dublin would joining the ranks of other local first class townships - such as Whitemarsh, Radnor, Whitpain, and Lower Gwynedd - that have significant open space. ROSLE is looking for like-minded residents of Upper Dublin and Ambler Borough to join in their mission. ROSLE is meeting bi-weekly at the Upper Dublin Township Building. The next meeting is Wednesday, June 4 at 7 p.m.

The group want to preserve and open the castle, lake, sunken garden and other spaces to the community - which have been closed to the public for many years.

Changes Approved by Spring House Area

In a recent conversation with Lower Gwynedd Township supervisor Mark Gray, we learned of some zoning changes and development approvals that will affect the Spring House area. Whole Foods will be moving their store from 309 down to the SpringHouse corner. The steps involve the demolition of the complex which includes the Starbucks and Appegio's Restaurant. They will both have new sites nearer to the pond - after the demolition of the house which has been the site of several businesses over the years.

The new Whole Foods will be similar to the one at Plymouth Meeting - much larger than the existing one.

Meanwhile Giant has abandoned plans for a gas station at the corner of Bethlehem and Norristown across from SpringHouse Tavern.

Mr. Gray also talked about the Ingersoll House which is located behind the Lower Gwynedd Township Building. Over the years, the Township has replaced windows and the roof as well as installing heating. A use for the building is still being sought.




Scouts Work on WVHS Library
