
Rain Gardens Tour

A tour of seven Ambler rain gardens is scheduled for June 7 from 2 to 4 p.m. The tour begins at 331 Mattison Avenue - with registration in a driveway on North Street between Mattison and Euclid Avenues. Sponsored by Ambler EAC and the Borough of Ambler, the tour will highlight an effective way of managing rain and run-off. When Ambler was built, two creeks (Rose Valley and Tannery Run) were buried under the streets and properties. With development and more impervious surfaces, runoff after rain is a problem for Ambler as well as for the Wissahickon Creek into which the local creeks flow.

A recent open meeting held at Germantown Friends highlighted how the historic development of the area is one cause of the deterioration of water quality in the Wissahickon. Rain gardens is one strategy to help manage this problem as well as protect Ambler from flooding.

Historian Bob Whittock Completes Booklet on Boehm's Church

The latest publication by our historian Bob Whittock is off the press. The History of Boehm's United Church of Christ celebrates the 275th anniversary of the church at 571 Penllyn-Blue Bell. Bob complied the booklet using historical records, diaries, newspaper articles, sermons, and books. (Bob, himself, has written three other booklets about Boehm's - about its stained glass windows and about those interred in Boehm's Cemetery.)

The booklet is a rich source of information about people and events from the early days of Whitpain area through present day. (For example, in July Boehm's will be celebrating Christmas in July as part of their 275th anniversary - with classic German Christmas carols and German Christmas cookies.)

One section of the book outlines preparation for defense of community during WWII. It describes the troop movements along DeKalb Pike - as soldiers were moved to New York on their way to Europe. It also describes how a group of woman would meet once a week at the 1895 Schoolhouse to sew quilts and items for the Red Cross. Bob also records that in June 1942 blackouts were ordered in all of eastern Pennsylvania. The Centre Square Fire siren would sound at 10:30 p.m. Air Raid Wardens would patrol, sometimes on horseback, and if they saw any light at all at a window, they knocked on the door and made sure the lights were turned out. During school time air raids, the children would go to the basement at the 1895 Schoolhouse.

Thanks to Bob for another fact filled and interesting record about our local community history.



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
