
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# The Wissahickon Valley Historical Society announces its March 14, 2016 meeting.

#### **Recent Donations**

Fran Treisbach recently donated a photo of the 1933 Whitpain High School girls basketball team. She provided a list of names and wonderful details to go with the photo. For example, girls basketball in the 1930s (and into the 1960s) used half court rules. There were 6 players on a team: 3 defense and 3 offense players who stayed on

their respective ends of the court. Fran's full story is on display with the photo at the 1895 Schoolhouse.

Buck Amey recently called the WVHS and offered a set of photos and documents from Ambler High School and Shady Grove Middle School. The items are a wonderful addition to our school archives, but the story behind them is also interesting. A number of years ago a group of students noticed the items in a dumpster outside the school and checked with teacher/coach Frank Licopole. He suggested that they retrieve the items, and he organized them. Most of the photos



are not identified, but they represent a wonderful record of activities - sports, drama, music at Wissahickon schools. This would make a great project for anyone interested in processing and cataloguing a collection.

## Building a History - Story by Story

In a recent newsletter, it was mentioned that Blue Bell Elementary parents and students are putting together a history of their school. Parent Joyce Keller has gathered items from the Township, the school records, the WVHS, and first hand stories to be used in a planned display at the school.

By chance several WVHS members are retired teachers who taught at Blue Bell in years past. Several members were also students in the



school's early days. From them, we learned about the Carolyn Haywood book *Away Went the Balloons* which is based on a balloon release that took place each year from the school fair in the 1960s and 1970s. The school fair was mentioned in the book. Fran Treisbach recently noticed the Whitpain June Fair banner (shown above) in our collection. She said that the banner is from a Blue Bell Elementary fair - held on the 1st weekend of June each year. She remembers games, horse rides, and a bake sale on the playground which is between the "new" school and the 1916 building. She remembered two teachers of the 1950s - Mrs. Burkart and Mrs. Morley. Both of their husbands were stationed in Korea at the time.

Dot MacDermott remembered that long time Wissahickon teacher Merritt Bender would be in charge of cooking the BBQ chicken to be served at the fair dinner. Emmy Simon remembers her sister making large flowers from various materials to sell at the craft sale. Please share any memories you might have of early Blue Bell Elementary days.

## **Update on Ambler Sites**

No news on the development at Lindenwold Estate. Preservation Pennsylvania did recently place the site on its Pennsylvania At Risk list. This means it is one of "the state's most endangered historic resources". It was nominated by Residents for Open Space at Lindenwold Estate. Check out their web-site for updates.

Watch for an article about the Mary Ambler house in the next newsletter. The gentleman who owned the house recently died. The house may be the oldest house in Ambler.
