Society Receives Grant from CCAHA

The Wissahickon Valley Historical Society recently received notice that it has been awarded a grant by the Conservation Center for Art and Historic Artifacts of Philadelphia. Two members of CCAHA's Preservation Services staff will spend a day in June at the 1895 Schoolhouse and help us draw up a preservation needs assessment plan for the building and collection.

The program has been funded through the support of the William Penn Foundation.

As part of the grant, the curatorial staff will also attend training sessions in the CCAHA's Collection Care Training Series.

Floss Levy's Kugel

1 lb. medium egg noodles
2 c. sugar
8 eggs, separated
salt

1/2 lb. butter2 pints sour cream1/2 raisins

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cook noodles and drain them. Melt butter. Cool. Beat the sugar, egg yolks, and salt.

Beat the egg whites but not too stiff.

Mix egg yolk mixture and butter. Add sour cream.

Rinse the noodles and mix with the yolk mixture. Stir in the egg whites and raisins. Butter a $9^{\circ} \times 13^{\circ}$ pan and bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour until the mixture is firm and the top is brown.

Cool and cut into pieces. It is rich!

A Short History of our Building

Information from Bob Whittock

Though we call our building the 1895 Schoolhouse, it has had numerous reincarnations. It was built in 1895 as a high school for students from several area one-room schools. The first floor was used for 1 through 8 grades; the second floor for 3 years of high school.

The PTA was organized in 1922. The PTA sponsored a hot lunch program with a cafeteria and lunch room in the basement. The building was also used for meetings of community organizations.

After the brick school building was completed next door, the 1895 building was used for storage. In 1923 and 1924 the first floor was again used for 4th and 5th grades. From 1926 to 1929, it became the 7th and 8th grades in a Junior High arrangement.

In the 1950s various classes used the upstairs and downstairs as needed. In 1968, the Whitpain Library rented the top floor and in 1974 rented the entire building for its operations.

The building was later used by Whitpain Township for their police headquarters. In 1985, the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society began renting the building from Whitpain Township and undertook extensive work on the building so it could be opened as a museum and meeting place.
