Meet Our Local Artists - Fred Kreitchet

Last spring Jim and I followed the Norristown Art League's Art Trail and found ourselves on School Road and visiting WVHS member and local sculptor Fred Kreitchet.

About a half a mile from the 1895 Schoolhouse, Fred works on 3-dimensional projects in the studio behind his house. The two story studio is filled with neatly organized materials and tools and projects in various stages.

After completing his Master's degree at Penn in 1975, Fred needed to find a way to earn a living as an artist. Over the years, he has focused on 3-dimensional pieces - often working with clients to design site specific sculptures.

When Fred and Carol Kreitchet moved to their historic home on School Lane, they joined the WVHS. After a fire in the barn, they rebuilt it as a complementary studio for Fred's work.

One of his biggest projects was for the Philadelphia Zoo. The Tree House was built in the 1980s from fiberglass and involved a crew of 15. It still hosts zoo visitors.



Fred works with bronze, fiberglass, wood, and welding steel. He often creates rubber and plastic moulds for his projects and then fills them with fiberglass and other materials. The moulds are then removed and can be used again. In addition to commissions, he has created medallions, figurines, and frames for local organizations including Valley Forge National Park.

Always interested in how things are made, Fred is inspired by Michelangelo's marble work, Ukrainian Alexander Munenko's work in steel, and Maurice Lowe (a sculptor who cofounded the UPenn Graduate School of Fine Art).

Fred spent part of his youth in Germany and remembers several early influences. He enjoyed art classes, and his father was a carpenter and his mother, a knitter. He has always been interested in process - how to get from here to there.

In addition to his own creative work, Fred teaches at MCCC where he enjoys working with students. His classes focus on 3-dimensional design. His students' work decorate the hallways of MCCC's new arts building.

A show featuring Fred's and his daughter Heidi's works will open in January at MCCC. Heidi, who lives in California, works in ceramics.

It is always fun to discover artists in our midst. We can recommend the Norristown Art Trail which has been held the past couple of springs. You never know who you'll meet.

Schoolhouse Hosts Blue Bell 3rd Graders



The 1895 Schoolhouse hosted three 3rd grade classes from Blue Bell Elementary School in October. They are studying local history with a focus on the Lenni Lenape who lived in this area. Peg Johnston and Emmy Simon presented a lesson about the Lenni Lenape as it would have been presented to students in 1895. Similarities (foods that all enjoyed, plants and animals of the area, and the use of back-packs) as well as differences (trying to stay warm without electricity and the lack of electronic equipment) were discussed. Emmy shared her expertise in plant dyes when we talked about the petroglyphs and art work of the Lenni Lenape.

The students also visited the museum. An item that always fascinates them is the type writer. They can see the connection with the computer, but have lots of questions about how the typewriter works and laugh when they hear about using an eraser and carbon paper. They also enjoy the photos of classes from the

early 1900s with special interest in the clothes and hair styles of the children and teacher. Students are encouraged to bring their families for the visit to the Schoolhouse.

Market Day Results
