The Ingersoll house has been rehabbed by the Township and is located just off of Old Bethlehem Pike.

## WVHS Hosts Pastors' Group

More than 20 members of the Pastors' of Colonial Churches of Montgomery County gathered at the 1895 Schoolhouse on Oct. 22 for their bi-annual meeting. WVHS President **Russ Bellavance** gave the program about the history of religious freedom under the Constitution and about the history of the WHS/WVHS.

Over coffee and pastries, the group shared news of events in their home churches and toured the schoolhouse. A couple of the delegates had local connections and shared stories of places and events of interest. (Watch for next month's story about the asparagus fields of Whitpain and the artifact of the endeavor we have in our collection.)

### Out-reach to Schools

A survey of local history was shared with Mrs. Swanger's third grade class at Blue Bell on October 6. Third grade curriculum emphasizes the cultural development of the area. This was an opportunity to follow the contributions of the LenniLenape, the early Swedish, Welsh, English, and German settlers, and the later arrival of the southern and eastern Europeans as well as African Americans.

The Shady Grove library will host a WVHS display on schools of the past in the coming month. The exhibit will include books, slates, a lunch pail, and other school items of the early 20th century.

It all started in Sept. 2014 when the Society received an unsolicited e-mail from **Krista Lewis.** In this note, Krista explained her education in history and public history, and simply stated, "I'd very much like to lend a hand to the WVHS." Well, she decided to help us put our museum collection on a computer database. The Society had zero at the time. Krista, in consultation with me, screened, then chose the most appropriate software to do the job. The Society bought the database software Filemaker, a Mac laptop, camera, etc. Krista, without prior knowledge of Filemaker or the Mac operating system, personally set up the computer, software, and entered our collection with description, photos, and other detailed information into a database. Her work was not in isolation, rather she collaborated with and trained Emmy, Peg, and others involved in the WVHS museum. Krista then took this a step further, and helped redesign the WVHS website to better incorporated the museum collection online. Now, the museum collection with over 3000 items currently listed is accessible to the world on the web. Krista's accomplishment is significant and notable. She has shown great initiative, intelligence, and generosity of her time. Krista is young in his career, and she has accepted a position in Minnesota where she can pursue her interest in museum collections at the professional level. She will be missed by myself and many others in the Society, and we all wish her the best!



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
