## **Noting changes**

Several properties along Penllyn-Blue Bell Pike are for sale. At least one of these has rich local history. In 1827, the Quakers split into two factions - the Hicksites and the Orthodox. This house was used as a meetinghouse for approximately 40 years - giving it the name Orthodox Cottage. Adjoining the property is a small graveyard that is still under the care of the Gwynedd Meeting.

On Butler Pike, the former Ambler Borough hall is in transition. The new owners have space rented to several professionals and new landscaping should



appear soon. The long-in-planning Ambler Food Coop will hopefully be making a site decision in October. A brew pub is scheduled for the former long empty site next to Denny's Electric.

# World War I Exhibit

Check out the World War I exhibit on the first floor of the 1895 Schoolhouse. The United States entered W.W.I in April of 1917. We have a number of documents as well as a uniform and trench-coat (wow, is that where the coat got that name? - yes, according to Wikipedia) in our collection. Bill Montelius (who presented a program about the Civil War for us a number of years ago) is sharing some wonderful artifacts from his WWI collection. We also have some sheet music of WWI era songs that were shared with us by the librarian at Springhouse Estates.

WVHS member Barry Johnson is still looking for local memorials for WWI veterans. In *Images of America - Ambler* by Frank D. Quattrone there is a photo of Lyman Rohr of Ambler who was killed in the second Battle of the Marne. Quattrone mentions a memorial bronze plaque in his honor at St. John's Evangelical. If anyone knows about the location of this plaque, please let us know.

#### **Wissahickon School District Celebrates**

Fifty years ago Whitpain School District, Ambler School District. and Lower Gwynedd School District officially joined together to form the Wissahickon School District. Plans for a celebration are being developed. Kristen Rawlings and Katie Meyer from the WSD recently spent several mornings at the 1895 Schoolhouse looking through our collection of documents and artifacts. ## **Parking Lot Rehab**

More thanks to Whitpain Township for their work on the parking lot. They have begun the resurfacing of the entire parking area. It will progress in several stages. The last stage will join the lots of the Korean church/1916 schoolhouse with ours. Check for the progress at the October 10th meeting. The regrading and resurfacing should prevent more water damage around the entryway to the building. The driveway would have originally been gravel or dirt.
