Reminders of the Past

Mabel Whittock recently donated a copy of the *Ambler Joint High School Handbook from 1952-1953*. It makes interesting and fun reading - especially as Wissahickon School District recently opened their 2017-2018 school year.

The following are a few interesting items: There were four curricula offered - college preparatory, business education, practical arts, and general. In the list of required courses for college preparatory currucula in 9th grade students would take algebra, in 10th grade - plane geometry, in 11th grade - algebra II, and in 12th grade - solid geometry/trigonometry. Students in every


curricula were required to take typing.

Foreign languages offered were Latin and French.

Driver education was offered to all eleventh graders. "Through the courtesy of the Mullin Motor Car Company, General Motors Corporation, and the American Automobile Association, a dual control car was provided for use in the training program. The Kiwanis Club of Ambler provided funds for housing, running expenses, and general maintenance of the vehicle."

There was also a Work Experience Training Program that placed high school students with local businesses. Students received at least 75 cents an hour. Placements were made only after an interview with the student's parents.



A quick review of the history of the Ambler High School: In 1881 the Ambler Independent School District was formed, a site on Forrest Avenue was purchased, and a two room building was erected. The first School Board met in a toll house situated on the present site of what became the Ambler Trust Company - located on Butler Pike.

Ambler Borough was incorporated in 1890 and established a Borough School Board that purchased the Forrest Avenue School for \$3,504.94. In 1891, a new sixroom, two story building was erected at Forrest Avenue. Four additional rooms were added in 1896. A new high school was built on Tennis Avenue in 1923. Fire destroyed the Forrest Avenue building in 1926. In 1927, a new junior high school building was erected on the site. It is now the home of Ambler's Senior Center and Art Center.



Extensive athletic fields were added to the Tennis Avenue in 1939. A building program completed in 1940 enlarged the high school building.

The Ambler Joint High School was organized in 1950 by the Ambler Joint High School Board composed of the Directors of the School Boards of Ambler Borough, Lower Gwynedd Township, and Whitpain Township.

WVHS Outreach

WVHS had an exhibit table at the recent Pike Fest (Lower Gwynedd) and at Whitpain Day at MCCC. Thanks to members who spent time assembling the displays, talking with visitors, and taking things back to the schoolhouse. Our booth now looks great and is quite comfortable - with our official table drape and shade cover. The exhibit box donated by Gary Fuess offers a safe way to display artifacts. The new brochure makes an excellent take-away.

Octoberfest in Ambler is next Saturday - October 7 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.. If you can help assemble the display (Thursday morning), set up the booth and chat with visitors, and/or take down the display, please let Russ Bellavance know. Every event has helped us make connections with community members and organizations.

Lindenwold Estate Update

According to a public notice dated September 25, the Lindenwold Residential Associates has submitted revised preliminary land development plans for the redevelopment of the Lindenwold Estate (Dr. Mattison's estate) and later St. Mary's Villa property on Bethlehem Pike. The proposal for the 44.62 acres consists of 32 twin units, 72 townhouses, and 250 senior "independent living" apartments. According to the proposal "the landmark castle will be preserved" - though

there are no details. A conditional use approval for this development was granted by the Board of Commissioners on May 9, 2017.

Several public review meetings are scheduled: Shade Tree Commission - 10/19/17, Planning Commission -10/26/17, and Environmental Protection Advisory Board - 11/7/17. Residents for Open Space at Lindenwold Estate's website is at www.lindenwoldestate.org
