at the Roth Farm - for Sustainable Agriculture part of the Delaware Valley University

The Roth Farm site is owned by Delaware Valley University and was listed on the National Registry of Historic Places in 1999. The three-story house was built by 1832 by Andrew Layman. The barn is a typical Pennsylvania bank barn. The property also includes a root cellar.



The site is located along Route 202. The pictured buildings are at the corner of 202 and

Hancock Rd. Hancock crosses 202 between Gwynedd Friends' Meeting House and Rhodes Garden Store. Parking is in a lot at the end of a driveway off of

Hancock just behind the house and near the barn.



The barn is filled with antiques farm implements. Our own Gary Fuess will provide some explanations of the collection. The farm is a model for sustainable agriculture and provided produce for several local food banks including Hope of the Harvest.

Sunday, April 17th will be great day to tour three local historic sites. Evans-Mumbower Mill (part of the Wissahickon Valley Watershed), the


Franklinville School, and the 1895 Schoolhouse will all be open from 1 to 4 p.m.


These three local historical sites are within easy driving distance of each other and would make a fun family outing.



Featured Item from our Collection

The Centre Square Fire Company was formed in Feb. 1913 by a group of local residents. In 1949 the Saturday Evening Post came to Centre Square. The May 14, 1949 cover of the Post depicted volunteer firemen answering a call across the street from Reed's Department Store. The painter was Stevan Dohanos (1907-1994), an artist and illustrator from the social realism school, was best know for his Saturday Evening Post covers. He created over 125 covers for the Post. He has been compared to Norman Rockwell. Dohanos was founder of the Famous Artists School in Westport, CN. He worked in fine



art as well as commercial art. He painted several post office murals and designed several U.S. stamps. His paintings are in the collections of the Cleveland Museum of Art, Whitney Museum of Art, and the Penn. Academy of Fine Art. Dohanos, along with Rockwell, came to represent the quintessence of American magazine art.

The man running across the street in his pajamas has been identified as John Henryman, fire company secretary, in 1949.
