Amchem to Manufacture in Brazil

Lauffer and Family Moving to Sao Paulo

In July of this year, Amchem will officially begin manufacturing operations in the Company's new wholly-owned subsidiary, Amchem Quimica do Brasil, Ltd. in Diadema, a suburb of Sao Paulo. The facility will be on a 20,000-square meter (approx. five-acre) site. At present, temporary offices have been established in the city of Sao Paulo.

Initially, Amchem Quimica will manufacture and market chemicals for the various metalworking industries located in Brazil. However, plans call for expansion into the manufacture and selling of agricultural chemicals and the Foster line of adhesives, coatings and sealants, in the not too distant future.

According to Amchem President E. A. Snyder and John Eckman, President of Rorer-Amchem, the move was prompted by Brazilian regulatory conditions which made it impossible to operate through a licensee.

A nucleus of native Brazilian talent, headed by Jose F. Costa as General Manager, has been hired to launch the new subsidiary.

Completing the organization are Antonio De Martino, Metalworking Sales and Technical Manager, Patricio Roman,

Amchem Chairman Gerald C. Romig announced his retirement as an Officer of the Company at a meeting of the Board of Directors on February 28. He will, however, continue to serve as Chairman of the Board and retain his office at the Ambler headquarters. He will also remain on the Board of Rorer-Amchem.

Eugene A. Snyder will continue to serve in the dual role of President and Chief Executive Officer. Although no formal announcement was made of his appointment to the latter position, Mr. Snyder

has been functioning in this capacity since September, 1971.

Mr. Romig has spent his entire business career at Amchem, having started as a chemist in the Metalworking

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Chemical laboratories immediately after obtaining his masters degree in biological chemistry from Penn State University in 1928, where he also earned his B.S. the previous year.

He is the holder of 13 patents, including Granodine®, Thermoil Granodine®, and Lithoform®—all issued while working in the MCD labs.

In June 1945 he was elected Vice President of the Company and in July, 1956, he was named President when the late Leon Cherksey became Amchem's first Chairman of the Board. After the death of Mr. Cherksey in January, 1966, Mr. Romig was elected Chairman of the Board and Chief Executive Officer at its Annual Meeting in April of that year.

In addition to serving on the Board of Directors of Amchem and Rorer-Amchem, Mr. Romig is on the boards of the National Agricultural Chemical Association, the Association of Independent Colleges of Pennsylvania and the Abington Memorial Hospital. He is a member of Alpha Sigma Phi, the American Chemical Society and the Manufacturers Country Club.

Mr. Romig was born in Lancaster, Pa., the son of the late Rev. Edwin H. and Corinne C. Romig. He is married to the former Thelma T. Tither of Philadelphia. The couple are the parents of two children Gerald A. Jr. and Mrs. William C. Roxby. They also have six grandchildren.

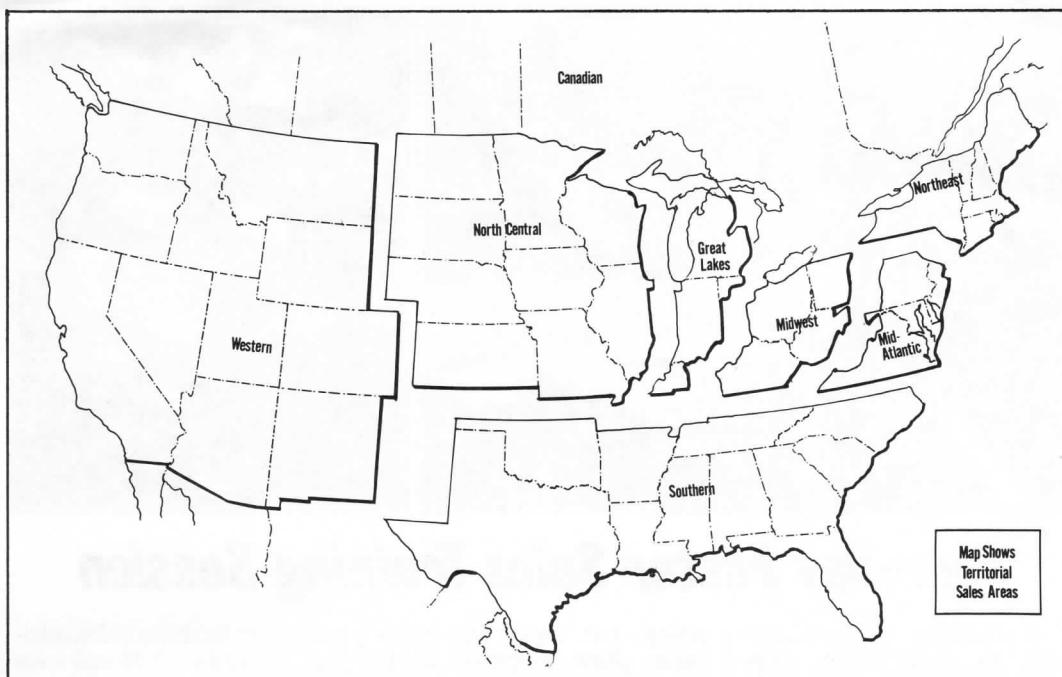
Mr. Snyder first became a Vice President of Amchem in September, 1965. He was named Executive Vice President in May, 1969 and President in May, 1970.

His Amchem career began in the MCD Research Laboratories in 1941. During his tenure as a researcher, he had eight patents issued to him. He later worked in the field as technical adviser to the Company's sales staff.

He was appointed Director of Purchasing in the summer of 1955. Additional duties included the carrying out of special administrative assignments for Mr. Romig.

Mr. Snyder was born in Philadelphia and graduated from Simon Gratz High School. He graduated with honors from the Towne Scientific School of the University of Pennsylvania with a B.S. degree in chemical engineering in 1939.

In a step-by-step procedure, Gibson first explained the difference between the suppliers of basic chemicals and the formulating chemical specialists like Amchem, then he defined the organizational set-up in MCD Sales, pointing out that this division is split into two basic groups: 1) by geography; 2) by industry.

Using a map, he showed how the United States is divided into seven sales regions—the Northeast, Mid-Atlantic, Midwest, Southern, Great Lakes, North Central, Western, plus Canada as the eighth. Each of these regions, he said, has a sales office and a staff of salesmen headed by a regional sales manager. The total number of salesmen for all territories is 63. Territorial size is based on the density of industry. For instance, with the auto industry heavily concentrated in the area around Detroit, this sales region is smaller and requires more intensive technical and sales coverage than the sparsely populated areas of the Far West. Thus a total of 20 salesmen are employed in the Great Lakes and North Central sales territories.

Aware of the essential contributions of the five major metalworking industries—aluminum, automotive, coil coating, steel, and fabricated metals—to the continued success of MCD, as well as potential sources for increased business, the Department has installed a sales manager and a marketing manager for each one of these industries. These men, with the exception of the automotive sales manager, are headquartered in Ambler, and are responsible for developing the major sales promotion plan for their respective industries,

as well as the development and promotion of new products and the establishment of research and development objectives.

Following this description of the marketing phase of MCD's operations, Gibson launched into a detailed explanation of the specific application of the various cleaning and conversion coating chemicals manufactured by Amchem.

With a collection of slide views, taken in customers' plants, he showed these chemicals being applied to a wide assortment of products.

In a final series of slides he showed a broad variety of finished products that had been first treated with Amchem pre-paint chemicals. These included a trash compactor, washers and dryers, metal office furniture, beverage cans, vending machines, aluminum siding, curtain walls, soffits, galvanized steel siding, automobiles, airplanes, etc.

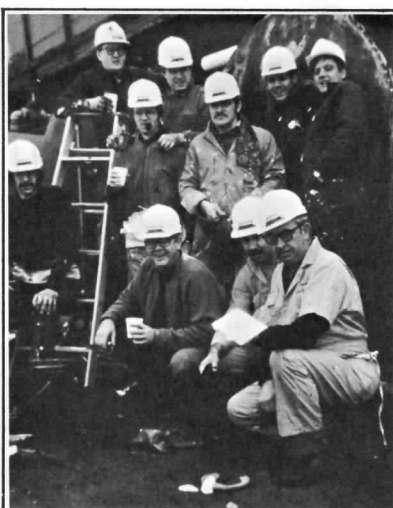

time of the Company's merger with Wm. H. Rorer in 1968.

He reported combined Rorer-Amchem sales of \$166 million for 1972 as compared

with \$150 million for 1971 and a rise in earnings of 9.1% for the same period. He told his audience: "With our established products retaining their present volume and with the introduction of new products, particularly Ethrel® in ACD and Alodine® NR-2 in MCD, we anticipate a continuance of this rate of increase in 1973."

Research Contributes Success

Reverting to research activities he emphasized that approximately 5% of gross sales were budgeted for this purpose and he felt that this expenditure was a very important factor in the Company's success. "In 1972 Amchem was granted 16 patents and 28 applications were made, which we hope will result in additional patents in the future, thus demonstrating the quality of the work done by the Amchem research staffs."

In his final remarks he paid tribute to the marketing men in both ACD and MCD, four of whom, incidentally, were recipients of inventor awards—Greg Gibson, Dwight Buczkowski, Pat Harrison and John Kirch. He also complimented all the other departments at Amchem, including plant and office personnel, for their contributions to the success of the Company.

Precopio Explains Purpose

In his opening address, Dr. Frank Precopio, Vice President-Corporate Technical Director, outlined the purpose of the awards and the necessary qualifications for participation. "From its very beginning," Dr. Precopio said, "Amchem was founded on technology and innovation, and this has continued to be the basis for our success. Gene Snyder, Ernie Szoke and I have

considered how we could honor our inventors in a special way and this affair is the result of our discussions. Firstly, we have established an Amchem inventors award, a medallion, imbedded in plastic with the inventor's name engraved on an indentifying plate. The rules for qualifying for awards are as follows: 1) Awards to be given to inventors who are employees at the time the patents are issued or retired employees, 2) Awards will be made for issued U.S. Patents only, 3) Inventors who have 1 to 9 patents will receive a bronze medallion, 4) Inventors who have 10-19 patents will receive a silver medallion, 5) Inventors with 20 or more patents will receive a gold medallion."

Dr. Precopio concluded by stating that starting as of January 1, 1973, an inventor who is an employee at time of issue will receive five shares of Rorer-Amchem stock for each U.S. Patent issued in his name.

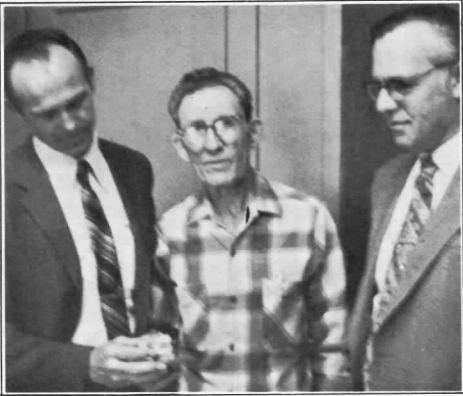

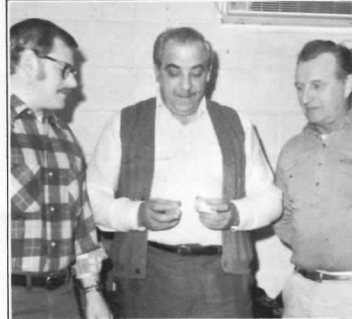

John's name appeared as an authority on aquatic weed control in a coverage of the annual meeting of the Northeastern Weed Science Society by a reporter for *THE NEW YORKER*. The meeting was held at the Commodore Hotel, New York City, earlier this year.

In an informal group discussion with other weed control experts John told the *NEW YORKER* newsman: "Water milfoil and pondweed are aquatic weeds, and they can be extremely dangerous. Swimming in a pond or lake, you can get tangled in them and drown. A very good friend of mine—a weed scientist—got drowned in some of these weeds while carrying out a scientific investigation."
