## Amateur Historian Extraordinaire: Yen Ho By Peg Johnston

Yen Ho has been a great help to the study of local history and to WVHS. Over the past two years, her Amateur Historian blog has featured people and places in the Wissahickon Valley. Yen has generously shared her always-interesting entries on the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society web-site. Be sure to check out this great source for local history stories. Thank you, Yen! And she has done more:

Yen is a Wissahickon School District graduate and continued her studies at Temple (BS - Architectural Preservation) and Drexel University (MS - Library and Information Science).

She can trace her interest in history all the way back to a placemat of all the presidents - up to George W. Bush - that her parents gave her as a child. She remembers all of the history courses that she took at Shady Grove, Wissahickon Middle School, and Wissahickon High School. Then her interest in local history grew when she did field work for courses at Temple.

Over the past couple of years, Yen has volunteered at the WVHS - taking on a variety of tasks - from accessioning to researching to painting and cleaning. She also worked at the Peter Wentz Farmstead, where she helped update their archives and library.

Meanwhile, Yen has developed connections with several local sites. She remembers celebrating the end of many school years at Mermaid Lake in Whitpain. This site's future is in the hands of Whitpain Township with at least part of it now being preserved as open space.

Several local houses also captured Yen's imagination. Unfortunately the Foulke mansion no longer exists, except in photos, but the Revolutionary-era words of its young visitor/resident, Sally Wister, remain with us. The mansion was located in

Penllyn, but demolished in the 1990s. Yen's recent Amateur Historian blog about the Ingersoll-Clayton house drew over 100 responses with several of them from descendants of the Ingersoll-Clayton family.

Yen moved back to Vietnam with her parents in August. Her parents came to the United States from Vietnam at the end of the war and look forward to retiring there. Yen will start a job there as a teacher-librarian at the Western Australian International School System in Saigon (Ho Chi Minh City).

## **Notes from the Board of Directors' August Meeting**

- The Board is waiting for the \$20,000 from the Keystone Communities
   Program grant to be mailed. The state is delayed because it is dealing with pandemic funding relief issues.
- 2. WVHS has recently obtained a PA vendor number (to receive the grant funds) and a PA state sales tax exemption number.
- Matt Metcalf, a new Board member, has already volunteered to take over the WVHS display cases at each of the municipal buildings, replacing Peg Johnston.
- 4. The books in the library are sticking to the paint on the shelves (installed in the 1990s, according to Frank Russo). So a future project will be to line the shelves with acid-free felt.
- Joe Langella is investigating WVHS having a table at the three local fall festivals.

- 6. The Board continues to investigate ways to designate what we are calling Revolution Road, Washington's route from Germantown to Schwenksville, now mostly Route 73.
- 7. Local townships may be setting up historical commissions. The Board is unclear what they would do and how WVHS would coordinate with them.
- 8. The Board has been reviewing the Bylaws. Proposed changes will be presented to the membership.
- Members are being asked to re-name the Newsletter, which will announce WVHS news and be distributed widely. A Bulletin, with research, will be published three times per year and available to members.
- 10. Carol is trying to get contractors' estimates to continue work at the Franklinville School.
- 11. Open House at 1895 School will be held on November 7, 1-3 PM. It will showcase a WWII collection, focusing on the King's Daughters Newsletters and some special donations.
- 12. The "fall" wine-and-cheese fundraiser has been postponed until spring due to COVID restrictions.
- 13. Individuals who have been vaccinated and who wear a mask can visit the 1895 School by appointment only. This is also the Montgomery County policy.
- 14. Montgomery County Historical Society is planning a YouTube on the Franklinville School to create interest in our fundraising campaign for renovations.
- 15. Terry Leaness, a retired IT specialist, has volunteered to assist WVHS with archive work.




## Amchem Display at Ambler Yards and the 1895 School's Turret

The next time you are in Ambler, stop by Ambler Yards, Building 18 (the former Amchem lobby at 300 Brookside Avenue), to see the history display. Open during normal business hours, Ambler Yards offers innovative commercial property for lease at the former Amchem campus. The lobby contains several wall displays highlighting the history of Amchem, which previously manufactured metalworking and agricultural chemicals. WVHS member Joan Duxbury reports that she and member Gary Fuess, both former Amchem employees, worked on the wall displays with the Ambler Yards General Partners and their graphic designer, the wife of one of the partners.


The display case, which belongs to Ambler Yards, contains J.E.Marsden Glass Works items from the WVHS collection, along with Amchem memorabilia. Amchem and Marsden Glass Works moved to the Ambler site in 1924 and shared the site until 1935 when Amchem purchased the closed Marsden Glass Works property. This was the beginning of the site expansion for Amchem.

In 2015 Ambler Yards acquired the 26 acre Amchem property and has renovated it into a one-of-a-kind open and flexible workspace.
