Speaker for our May Meeting--Monday, May 6, at 7 PM at the 1895 School:

Josh Kasper is the Assistant Executive Director of the American War of Independence (AWI) Privateer Museum, Schooner Pursuit Historical Society. He says, "I have been involved in living history in one form or another since I was born and have been with the AWI Privateer Museum since 2017... I have also worked as a historical interpreter at Washington Crossing State Park between 2019 and April of this year." Recommended to WVHS by Frank Russo, Josh will tell us more about his organization, its mission, and the important role of privateers during the American Revolution.



Election to fill WVHS Board Opening: Barry Johnson has agreed to sit on the WVHS Board of Directors. At the May 6th meeting, members will be asked to officially elect Barry, following the WVHS By Laws. (A regular election for all officers will be held in May 2024, an even-numbered year, for the Society Year beginning on September 1, 2024.) Johnson says he grew up in Missouri and graduated from the University of Cincinnati with a degree in history, but he became a software developer. He moved to Blue Bell in 1978 to work at Sperry, and he retired from Philadelphia's Thomas Jefferson University Hospital in 2013. A WWI re-enactor, he joined WVHS after visiting the Franklinville School. Since then, he has assisted WVHS by making digital images of our maps and other items, and he has been making videos of the monthly speakers' series. One of Johnson's favorite sayings is "We are tomorrow's history."

(A few hundred dollars will return to the state coffers.) But work is never done; a security light will be added soon, and the building now needs a new roof (and more)!




Old Photo Shows Tree-Planting at Franklinville School: Sandi Feight-Hicks, who is Parks and Recreation Director at Lower Gwynedd Township, recently sent this newspaper article about Arbor Day being celebrated by students from Stoney Creek Elementary School in about 1983 or 1984. (1983 is the year that the Historical Society of Whitpain was established with the goal of restoring Franklinville School. She found the photo in a box in her attic and relates that she remembers the day. Note the empty fields behind the school; the Windemere housing development had not yet been

built. The students are standing where the white rail fence stands today. Still surviving, the tree is now two stories tall.

Spring Cleaning Can Uncover Lost Treasures for WVHS: As you clean out your attic and closets, please remember that WVHS can use items of local historic interest. We especially like photographs showing local sites as they used to appear or showing local events in years gone by.

WVHS Past President (1987-88) speaks at April's meeting: Mark Ashton is still serving our society because last month he presented the biography of Philadelphia architect Thomas Ustick Walter (1804-1887). In those days, with no official training available, Walter began as an apprentice at age 15 to the famous Philadelphia architect, William Strickland (1788-1854). Walter designed the Water Works; Girard College, the largest building in

the U.S. and with a marble roof; and Moyamensing Prison, which had central heat and water, unlike most homes at the time. Ashton gave a long list of Walter's amazing accomplishments and used many illustrations. Ashton included Walter's work in Washington D.C. and a discussion of the design of Philadelphia's City Hall. It is the largest masonry building in the world with eight stories (four stories above-ground and four below-ground) and 700 rooms. Constructed before electricity, it took 30 years to build!

SEPTA Still Threatens Ambler Historic Building: To save the Train Station's Freight House, WVHS asked that SEPTA move it to a new position, where it would be safe from creek flooding, rather than demolish it. After consulting its legal, real estate, and insurance offices, SEPTA recently refused to accept the idea of moving the Freight House but gave

no reason. PA SHPO has asked SEPTA for more details, and WVHS is also waiting for the reply. In the 1980s, WVHS saved another historic Ambler Train Station building, using hundreds of volunteer hours and raising \$50,000 for improvements through grants, donations, and fundraising. Today, it features the lovely La Provence restaurant, pictured here:

be bringing, main course, side dish, or dessert. For the auction, please bring a wrapped item, either something useful, something hilarious, or both!


Volunteer Days are Thursdays, 11 AM-1 PM: Stop by the 1895 School to help with cleaning and organizing our Collection and our lovely building.



The exhibit's text includes a list of why Americans clean in the spring, describing history and science, i.e., ethnic/religious traditions, as well as our physical and psychological reactions to warmer, longer days.

WVHS has Created a New Display at the Ambler Borough Office, Featuring the "Great Train Wreck of 1856": The exhibit will continue until the end of June. It explains why the accident occurred and its horrible aftermath. The train wreck was the *worst in the world* at the time, and it led the town to be named after Mary Ambler because of the aid she brought to its victims.
