LAFAYETTE'S FAREWELL TOUR as The Nation's Guest

In 1784, the Marquis de Lafayette returned to America as a representative of France. He spent a week at Mount Vernon and then departed from his



beloved George Washington, expecting to return again soon.

Events intervened, including the French Revolution, and Lafayette did not return again until 1824, when Congress and President Monroe begged the Hero of Two Worlds to make a final farewell tour.



Ambler Storytellers' "Eligibility Letter" Completed: For part of Ambler Borough to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places, Ambler Storyteller Mary Spross and President Carol Kalos have completed the first step in the long process of recognition. (Ambler Storyteller Zibi assisted them from his job in Europe!) They met every Tuesday evening during the summer to complete this preliminary step. The Eligibility Letter asked for maps, photos, Ambler history, a comparison of Ambler to other towns in the area, and more. The group is applying for Ambler's history to be recognized as unique because it was a "company town" during the first part of the 20th century when Keasbey and Mattison's asbestos manufacturing dominated the economy. Is the National Register of Historic Places Misunderstood? From AASLH: The National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers has issued a report on how we recognize our historic places, with attention on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). NRHP is often misunderstood and has not been widely used to recognize places of importance to many Americans whose history, sites, buildings, and neighborhoods may have been intentionally or unintentionally overlooked or not considered. Read the report.

Wild Fire Destroys Maui Historic District: The loss of a rich history is profound. The town was a favorite port for Hawaiian kings and queens, whaling ships, and Christian missionaries. At the center of the fires lies the Lāhainā Historic District, designated a National Historic Landmark in 1962, and once serving as the capital of the Hawaiian Kingdom.

Fallen Tree at Franklinville School: Sadly, an old Silver Maple tree has died, toppling into the neighbors' trees. The trunk is hollow and has been leaning for years. The Board of Directors has hired an arborist to remove the tree and complete additional tree trimming at the property.



What stone was used to create our local milestones? WVHS asked our readers about what kind of stone was used to make our local milestones. Local historian and member Tamra Phillips was curious, so she did some research. One article she found, written by the Lower Merion Historical Society, explains that the milestones along the Main Line roadways are made of granite. And another article she found indicates that the milestones are made of different materials, depending on where they

were located (and who placed them there). Our question remains if our local milestones are sandstone or limestone. Anyone know?

Dedication of Mary Ambler's New Grave Marker: Members of Mary Ambler's family and a small group of WVHS guests met at the Gwynedd Meetinghouse Cemetery across from the William Penn Inn on August 18 to mark 155 years since Mary Ambler's death and to dedicate a new headstone for her. The informal ceremony resulted from Linda Green, Mary's third great-granddaughter, discovering that the former marker had been damaged. Vice President Joe Langella welcomed the guests, including Ambler Mayor Jeanne Sorg. President Carol Kalos described how Mary become a local hero for her role in caring for the injured after the Great Train Wreck of 1856, the nation's worst train accident at that time. Kalos also explained that those present would remember the ceremony although Mary Ambler, as a Quaker, would be appalled at any ritual or recognition. Each guest placed a button at the headstone to show their honor for Mary Ambler. A full transcript of Kalos' remarks will appear in the next issue of *The Quill*, sent to WVHS paid members.

Most notable is the walking stick, pictured here. She writes that it belonged to "my grandfather, Courtlandt S. Morris. He was the local Justice of the Peace from 1920 until his death in 1938. He succeeded his father, John Morris, who was Justice of the Peace until he passed away in 1920. The 'courthouse' was in the living room at our home in Centre Square [1475 Skippack Pike, purchased by Courtland in 1912]."

The County is extending the deadline for their photography contest from now until Tuesday, September 12, 2023. All Montgomery County residents are invited to participate in this contest for **America250PA Montgomery County.**



This year's theme will be Montgomery County's Historic Sites; to be eligible for the contest, photographs must be taken at a county, state, or national historical site, historical marker, and/or park in Montgomery County. MontCo residents participating in this kick-off contest may submit one entry per household in one, two, or all three categories for pictures taken from July 1, 2023, until September 12, 2023:

- Youth: MontCo residents ages 10-18 are encouraged to get out, explore, and take a picture at a historical site to capture something they find interesting. Entries must be submitted on behalf of the young photographer by a parent or guardian.
- Historical Elements: Capture a photo of the unique architectural, art, technology, or cultural element from a historical site. Open to ages 19 and up.

 Natural Beauty: Photographers entering this category are encouraged to find that perfect shot of anything that captures nature's beauty at one of the historical sites. Open to ages 19 and up.
