

Dr. Friederike Baer on Hessian Soldiers

Between 1776 and 1783, about a third of those fighting for the British were Germans, today called the Hessian soldiers. Some died in Whitpain Township. What was the Revolutionary War like for these German soldiers who fought alongside the British? What did they think of North America? What did they gain or lose by their service? And what happened to them after the war?

Dr. Baer's research has earned her the Society of Cincinnati Prize for an outstanding book about the American Revolution.

In her new book, *Hessians: German Soldiers in the American Revolutionary War*, published by Oxford University Press, historian Dr. Friederike Baer offers a groundbreaking reimagining of Britain's war against American independence from the perspective of German soldiers as well as civilian members of the corps. The book relies heavily on German-authored private and official records from both German and the U.S. archives, including a large body of material that has not previously been examined by scholars of the Revolutionary War. Rather than being a traditional military history, the book draws on these German-authored impressions of the American war as well as descriptions of the built and natural environment, local customs and manners, slavery, and encounters with Native Americans, to offer an original, richly textured account of this pivotal time in American history. - A thermometer, labeled "G.M. Deck & Co," found in the loft of an old Susquehanna Road barn, David Kings

- A detonator and a telegraph key, used to send Morse Code,

- Her great-grandfather's antique conch "seashell horn," Carol Kalos

Funds Still Needed for Engineering Study of Ambler's Old Train Station's "Freight House": WVHS needs another \$1000 to meet the expenses of the engineering study, which should be ready soon. The study will estimate the cost of repairs and suggest ways to use the structure, its adaptive re-use. In October, SEPTA announced plans to demolish the pre-Civil War Freight House. However, Pennsylvania has determined the Freight House to be eligible for national register historic recognition in two ways: the Ambler Borough Commercial District and the North Pennsylvania Railroad Linear Historic District, including the three buildings at Ambler's Old Train Station.

Private donors have assisted the effort, coordinated by the historical society, to find a new, useful purpose for the old structure. You can help WVHS by

"Freight House Red" is an American Amber Ale. It is a special brew created at Tannery Run Brew Works to benefit WVHS and the "Save the Freight House" campaign, and it is now available at Bar 31, Harry's Taproom, and Tannery Run Brew Works. Beer glasses depicting the Freight House are also available at the three bars (while supplies last). All proceeds will help to save the old building. New research shows that it is older than previously stated, and it may be the first train building in Ambler!



The attic of the old Ambler Hotel's stone stable, now occupied by Amazing Decks, but <u>marked for demolition</u>. Near Decks Hardware, it sits across West Race Street from the Freight House. Its builders in the 1800s used trusses, like a bridge, over the Tannery Run Creek, which also flows under the Freight House. The Ambler Hotel was destroyed by fire on Christmas Eve, 1946.

Around Ambler reports: Deck's Hardware, an Ambler Main Street staple for more than a century, closed its doors for good on December 23. The family-owned hardware store was founded by Garnett M. Deck in 1908. "The store itself is actually a conglomeration of buildings, the centerpiece of which dates to 1875. The other interconnected sections of the store include a former stable that wasn't added until later," <a href="https://docs.philadelphia"><u>Hidden City</u></a>

"America 250" releases its new design: It is similar to the 1976
Bicentennial symbol because both were made by the same branding and graphic design company, and both use a "ribbon-based pattern." For the 2026 anniversary pattern, Chermayeff & Geismar & Haviv explains that it used red, white, and blue ribbons to "signify commemoration, celebration, and purpose. The number 250 is formed from a single continuous sweep of the three ribbons, suggesting unity, cooperation, and harmony while serif lettering spells out 'America."
