

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Please bring an item for SHOW and TELL: WVHS Meeting on Monday, January 8, at 7 PM. The meeting will be a "Show and Tell," so bring one of your historic or special items to the meeting and be prepared to tell the group about it—just 3-5 minutes. Prior Show-and-Tell programs were great fun with a chance for guests to learn new things and enjoy each other's company. Light refreshments and social time will complete the evening.

Public Meeting about SEPTA changing its Ambler Train Station's parking lot: SEPTA has proposed offering a major portion of the train station's parking lot to a developer. Ambler Borough Council has already changed its zoning code to accommodate new construction. For you to find out more and to express your opinion to SEPTA officials, SEPTA has scheduled an open house on Tuesday, January 30th at 6:30 p.m. at the Ambler Borough Hall Gymnasium to show the "Ambler Station Area Concept." The purpose of this open house is to "solicit input from riders, residents, and businesses about the possibility of development on portions of the SEPTA train station parking lot." Efforts Continue to Save Ambler Train Station's Freight House: In October, SEPTA announced plans to demolish the pre-Civil War Freight House. However, Pennsylvania has determined the Freight House to be eligible for national register historic recognition in two ways: the Ambler Borough Commercial District and the North Pennsylvania Railroad Linear Historic District, where is consists of "three major components" (the three buildings at Ambler's Old Train Station).

A meeting of SEPTA and WVHS officials created a demolition delay, so that WVHS could find a way to save the structure. After that meeting, WVHS announced its understanding that "both groups prefer that the building should remain where it is positioned now." Then WVHS hired J&M Preservation Studio, a women-owned engineering firm, to complete a structural assessment and to propose plans and estimate costs for re-use of the building. WVHS made arrangements for SEPTA to open the building on December 18, when J&M began its study of the broken timbers under

the Freight House. It was a "weather advisory" day with pouring rain in the morning and a strong, cold wind in the afternoon.

The Brew Is Ready: "Freight House" beer, a special brew created at the Tannery Run Brew Works to benefit WVHS and the "Save the Freight House" campaign, is now available at Bar 31, Harry's Taproom, and Tannery Run Brew Works. Beer glasses depicting the Freight House are also available at the three bars while supplies last and with proceeds helping to save the old building. (New research shows that it is older than previously stated, and it may be the first train building in Ambler!)

## **Individual Donors Fund Engineering Study to Save Freight House:**

WVHS is grateful to the individuals and businesses who have helped raise the funds to pay for the engineering study conducted by J&M Preservation. A future issue of the *Valley Crier* will list the donors. A total of \$7,840 is needed, and thanks to the leadership of former WVHS board member Bernadette Dougherty, much of that amount has been raised. Everyone can do their part! It's not too late to send your check. Also, last month's

Valley Crier showed pictures of the "Save the Freight House" holiday ornament and the beer glass (mentioned above), which the Ambler Storytellers have been selling. 

**Special Speaker for February Meeting at Ambler Library, starting at 6:30pm:** Dr. Friederike Baer, a Penn State history professor, will relate the story of German (Hessian) soldiers during the American Revolution. Many served with the British in Whitpain Township! (Supposedly, several still haunt Skippack Pike's Camp Woods.) These men were not mercenaries; entire units were hired to fight for the British cause. Dr. Baer's book relates the Germans' personal impressions of not just the battles, but the Colonies' people and places. Her book, *Hessians: German Soldiers in the American Revolutionary War,* was honored to win the Society of Cincinnati prize as the year's best book on the American Revolution. (Members of that Society are descendants of officers of the Continental Army.) Friends of the Ambler Library will also be invited to this important WVHS program.



WVHS Presents Exhibit at Blue Bell Library: During December, WVHS displayed local, historic holiday-themed items from its collection. The display's central feature was a 1929 Christmas card, showing an 1800s horse-drawn sleigh at the Franklinville School. The greeting card was sent by the Strassburgers, then the owners of the 1858 one-room school, now on the NRHP. In keeping with the sleigh theme, a description of the "Jingle Bells" melody reveals the nature of the original lyrics, written for a minstrel show! One example is that "got upsot" meant got drunk. Also, the "Belsnickel," a Pennsylvania German tradition, is described. He's a Santa's "helper," who finds out if children are naughty by threatening them with switches. He is often shown wearing antlers and old clothes and with a beard and sooty face.




A dinner bell, newly cleaned and painted, but in need of a new post


Mystery Solved as Lower Gwynedd Township Preserves Broken Mile Marker: The broken milestone at Gwynedd Mercy University has been moved from its usual location, so that it can be repaired. The photo in November's *Valley Crier* revealed the marker curiously stating "17 MTC." Vice President Joe Langella, who visited its location on behalf of WVHS, recognized that part of the mile marker was broken off. He figured out that it used to say, "17 MTCP," or "17 Miles to the City of Philadelphia!"
