Monday, May 13, 7 PM, at the 1895 School: Bernadette Dougherty will speak on "The Deck Family: 100+ Years of History in Ambler." She has been promoting the history of Ambler for decades. She was the Ambler Main Street manager for many years, and you know her as the WVHS member who has worked the hardest to "Save the Freight House," the 1855 passenger station, now threatened by demolition. She has had experience with saving precious sites because she is credited with saving the historic Ambler Theatre. For this, *Legendary Locals of Ambler* calls her "Miss Persistence."

For our May meeting, Bernadette will present on Ambler's Deck Family, owners of Deck Hardware, which closed recently after serving the community for over 100 years! She has conducted interviews and looked for new information, so their story can be preserved.

Tuesday, June 4, 6:30 PM, Bellavance to speak at Lower Gwynedd Township Building: Lower Gwynedd Township and WVHS will host speaker Russ Bellavance and his presentation: *Gwynedd, Our Fair Land Through the Years.* The program will be held at 1130 North Bethlehem Pike in Spring House as the Lower Gwynedd Historical Advisory Committee and the Wissahickon Valley Historical Society present a program about the history of Gwynedd. Bellavance is a retired history teacher and the Past President of the WVHS who resides in Lower Gwynedd. He will note how, since its settlement by a group of Welsh families in 1698, the land which those settlers called Gwynedd (Welsh for "Fair Land") has seen many changes. Some are due to the individuals and families that settled there, with their unique cultures and traditions. Others are due to the reactions of

residents to political and technological changes in the larger community.

Today, Lower Gwynedd, Upper Gwynedd and North Wales Borough enjoy the inheritance of these earlier residents.

Spring Outing to Historic Trappe: Past President Frank Russo reports that on Saturday, April 20, twenty-one WVHS members took part in the society's first outing, post Covid. The group traveled to Historic Trappe, where they were met by the smiling faces of their guides for a two-hour tour of the amazing collections. They divided into two groups with one group starting at the Dewee's Tavern and the other at the Mulhenberg House. The focus of the museums are the Pennsylvania German collections, such

as Furniture, Fracktur, and the like, and what a tremendous collection it is. The members were mesmerized by how each building is superbly maintained and furnished. A great time was had by all!

April Meeting Revealed Generations of Harley-Family History: Many of us know the baseball field at Wentz Run Park as Harley Field. The 63-acre farm was never subdivided, so the land is now enjoyed by the entire community. The Harleys owned the Boxwood Farm on that property for three generations. Speaker Bob Harley has traced the story of his Harley ancestors beyond these generations to Ireland and outward to include their siblings. Bob explained how he searched old Census records and Philadelphia directories to find those family stories. He said Irish women always "fudged" their age, and he found the family have been weavers, grocers (with a store for decades on Market Street), bottlers (a "porterhouse" made beer), and farmers. The second portion of Bob's presentation included details about the career of his grandfather, Dick Harley, known for his speed, at-bats record, and his "circus catches," who played in the early 1900s on a handful of professional teams, and who later

coached at Villanova, Penn State, and University of Pittsburgh. The audience enjoyed Bob's discussion of his family memorabilia, especially Dick Harley's lovely, professionally-restored Georgetown College diploma.

Historic District for Ambler: A group of six diligent WVHS members, led by Mary Spross, meets weekly to fulfill the requirements for recognition through the National Register of Historic Places. Of four "Criteria," they will be submitting in the architecture category. They met recently with Megan McNish from PA-SHPO, who recommended a good book for all history lovers to see: Virginia McAllister's *Field Guide to American Buildings*.

Update on Ambler Train Station's 1855 Freight House: A WVHS investigation shows that the building has historic importance because it was Ambler's first passenger depot. (Mary Lou McFarland even wrote to the Library of Congress for details.) Today the structure, with its distinctive architecture, is unsafe because it straddles the broken Tannery Run culvert walls, and SEPTA says it must be moved, so that repairs can be made to the culvert. Representatives of SEPTA and WVHS met at the Freight House in April to discuss the issues. As a result, SEPTA has set a deadline of August 1 or else the lovely old building will be demolished! A Go Fund Me effort and other fund-raising and grant-writing are planned, so the Freight House can be relocated, maybe onto a trailer, until a permanent site can be found. (Estimate for the move is over \$40,000!) WVHS representatives have proposed that the Freight House may be repurposed to become a retail store or a focal point for a farmers' market near the railroad tracks. A special thank-you to Mark Chadwick, a retired architect, who has supplied ideas and drawings of how the Freight House might be used.

Another phrase states, "1082 Wissahickon Valley" (meaning unclear). The item was sent by Kurt Riegel of Riegel Restoration in Sidney, New York, who writes

The "Compuseum," a nonprofit, is focused on computer history.




Reason for using an "f" instead of an "s" in old typeface: Smithsonian (March 2024) says that old printing presses used only the round "s," the one "we use today, ...for the *end* of words...." The other "s" was an "f" without the left crossbar. As more people could read, more people were confused, so the practice ended.
